MORNINGS WITH MERYL

Long before first light or the chattering of magpies, the street cleaner crew is up and about, busy washing, cleaning, tidying and sweeping the streets of Fremantle.

If you've ever had a late night in Freo or found yourself going for a very early morning walk at 3am, you'll likely see the crew working their way through the CBD before heading out to the suburbs.

If you're lucky you may have even caught a glimpse of Meryl Sweep, a street sweeper and the newest addition to the street cleaners' fleet of vehicles.

Sweeper driver Zacc handles Meryl and has been a part of the street cleaner crew for about six years.

"I do a pre-sweep before the water truck comes and gives the footpaths and roads a really good clean and then I'll go behind the water truck and just sweep up the mess they blow into the road," he said.

"It's weirdly satisfying watching a street be cleaned," he remarked.

The street cleansing team works seven days a week to ensure Fremantle is business-ready every day, with a particular focus around the entertainment precincts over the weekend.

Malcolm, who operates one of the City's road sweepers, has worked with the street cleaner crew for over 19 years.

"The worst part about the job is occasionally getting covered in grease and having to wash the hopper out at the end of the day, especially during winter," he joked.

"But the best part is the satisfaction of a good job and clean road," he said.

From 1 July, the cleansing team will be operating 7 days per week. This will be from 3am-8.45pm weekdays, and 3am-12pm on weekends. So if you see the team out and about be sure to give them a wave.

GLOBAL EVENT SAILS INTO FREMANTLE

In a huge coup for Western Australia, Perth has been named as the first stop of the Rolex SailGP Championship for the next three seasons, with Bathers Beach as the chosen location.

The high-profile, global sailing event will be held in Fremantle from January 2026, attracting thousands of fans and being broadcast to an international audience in the millions.

Spectator vantage points will be set up around Bathers Beach, while the Inner Harbour and Victoria Quay will facilitate key parts of the event operations.

SailGP is raced by more than a dozen national teams competing in 50-foot catamarans that reach speeds of more than 100 km/h.


TREE CANOPY POLICY

Fremantle Council has taken a proactive step to preserve Fremantle’s existing tree canopy, often lost in demolitions and subdivisions, with the adoption of a tree retention policy.

The policy regulates the removal of large trees on private properties that are coded R30 and below as well as land zoned as ‘Industrial’.

A development application is now required for a mature tree to be removed, and two replacement trees must be planted.

FREMANTLE LIBRARY

Fremantle Library is trialling a change of their opening hours to 8am to 6pm Monday to Friday.

Previously the Library was open from 9am to 7pm Monday to Friday, but studies showed there was demand for an earlier opening with a drop off in numbers in the evening.

There has been no change to weekend opening hours or public holiday opening hours.

A review at the end of the six-month trial, which concludes in late October, will determine if the hours should change permanently.



TOURISM'S HIGHEST HONOUR

Fremantle will host the nation's most prestigious awards night for tourism.

The tourism industry's top echelon will descend on Fremantle in March next year for the Qantas Australian Tourism Awards.

A collaborative bid from Tourism WA and Business Events Perth secured the hosting honours, which will showcase Fremantle on a national stage.



ELDERS WOOL STORES

Final approval has been given for the redevelopment of the Elders Wool Stores.

The \$110 million project by developer Human Urban is the largest proposed heritage redevelopment in Western Australia.

The plans include more than 200 dwellings, with many to rent as part of a new co-living housing model, as well as hospitality and retail, with the world-famous skating ledge to be retained for use.



FREMANTLE LEISURE CENTRE

Visitors to the Leisure Centre will have noticed some new gym equipment.

All the old equipment has been replaced with new cardio and strength training machines from high-end sports equipment provider Technogym.

Become a gym member now to try out the virtual group fitness, virtual cycle studio and WA's first 'Technogym Checkup' body scanner.

There are more improvements planned for the Leisure Centre, with the 50-metre pool undergoing major repairs in the second half of this year. The works include re-tiling sections of the 50-metre pool and replacement of the filter system.

While the 50-metre pool is closed, swimmers will still be able to use the covered 25-metre pool, program pool and leisure playground pool.

FIVE MINUTES WITH...



Rosslyn de Souza space artist

With rubber gloves and designer glasses, Fremantle's 2025 Community Citizen of the Year is a bit of an identity around town as 'the lady who makes beauty', one window at a time.

Since October 2021, in partnership with ArtSource and the City of Fremantle, you've given exposure to more than 70 WA artists through the Street Gallery Fremantle Project which transforms vacant shop windows into mini galleries. Why do you do it?

I can't do anything about what's happening in Gaza, I can't help the madness that's happening in America, all I can do is try and make a small change in my town.

It's dramatically reduced damage and defacing of buildings and windows. It's given artists something to seriously look forward to. It also lights the way for people to feel safe as they walk by.

I'm doing it for the planet. I'm doing it because I love this city. I'm doing it because I want to be an example to young people.

And all the window cleaning that goes with it?

How could you have a beautiful artwork and dirty windows? It's like having a designer dress and shabby shoes!

Sometimes you spend close to 20 hours a week on this project. Do you ever get any feedback on your labour of love?

I could tell you so many stories about the appreciation. You just don't think that people walking by even notice. But the number of people who stop me when I'm cleaning the windows or dressing a window, they come from all walks of life.

People who live on the street, stop and say, 'I really love what you're doing' and when they ask me why I'm doing it, I tell them 'I want to give you something beautiful to look at, that will lift your spirits and make your day'.



What do you love about Fremantle?

It's a village within a city. I think the diversity of people here and that richness of not being monoculture that you find in certain other communities, is valuable because it's real.

What is your favourite thing to do in Fremantle?

I'm a café girl from way back. I like Elske, DaRaw (Nature Studio Gallery) and Cos (Baby Freo). I just sit quietly by myself, reading and people-watching.

And your guiltiest pleasure?

Chicho Gelato at around 3.30pm for a double scoop of vanilla and lavender honeycomb.

You were acknowledged as Citizen of the Year for your Street Gallery, Outside the Box Gallery and ArtWalk Freo creative initiatives, but you've hinted that you won't be doing it forever...

There's always a succession plan. I haven't quite worked out the finer details, but it's always in my mind that I am but a part of the whole. It's not about me. It's about keeping this going when I withdraw and move on.

That's what makes Fremantle unique. I am one of many who go about their business quietly and do stuff. So, when I wear the gong it's for all the silent warriors out there.

HOORAY FOR HILTON

Hilton was designed and built with community and a fair go in mind. Nearly eight decades later that spirit is alive and well.

Every suburb has a trait or two that makes it unique.

For Hilton, it's the curved streets, the mature trees, and the post-war houses with big front gardens and low fences.

But Hilton is also known for its community, which is no fluke because it was designed that way.

Hilton was built shortly after World War II by the then State Housing Commission during a time of high cost of living, expensive materials and high demand for housing.

It was one of a handful of so-called Garden Suburbs built for nuclear families: curvilinear road layouts, retained native vegetation, parks, and centrally located shops, schools and community facilities.

The new suburb, then known as Hilton Park, contained social housing, housing built for rent and homes for returned soldiers.

City of Fremantle Senior Heritage Officer Gena Binet said many of those houses were built quickly but with a social purpose in mind.

"The people who were moving into these houses were a lot of migrants, a lot of people who were being employed in some of the new expanding industries in O'Connor and Kwinana and places like that, so they're very much working people," she said.

Gena said Hilton was one of several garden suburbs at the time but unlike others that have been redeveloped or homes demolished, it's managed to maintain its look, feel and community connection.

"And it's this kind of layout that actually really fosters those attempts to connect in the modern world, which is great," she said.

Notre Dame senior archaeology and history lecturer Shane Burke said Hilton was part of the wider Indigenous area known as Coolbellup.

He said early European landowners such as C. Milson and J. O'Connor (after which that suburb was named) had 10 acre lots in the late 1890s in what would become Hilton.

Hilton was designed to create and support communities, and it seems that community spirit is on the up.

Earlier this year, the new version of the Hilton Precinct received the Active Citizenship Award at the City of Fremantle's Community Citizen of the Year Awards.

The group was recognised for supporting traffic calming measures, public art projects, coordinating verge makeovers, and hosting community events.

The precinct also has fundraising bin stickers, a craft club, paint-and-sip sessions, movie nights, book clubs and it raised \$5000 for a "cockitrough" to give birdlife a safe watering spot.

Convenor Emma Livesey, who said there was nowhere else she wanted to live, joined the group about two years ago.

"I just wanted to create a community that I wanted to be a part of," she said.

"One where we can just walk down the street and do something fun and different and get to know people."

The precinct has been supported by Meerilinga, which provides free meeting spaces, Curtin and Co Real Estate and Fremantle Rotary.

Emma said the precinct was always willing to hear from people who might have ideas but didn't know where to start.

"Let's see what we can do to make it happen," she said.

"I want people to think that Hilton Precinct is here to help people, make those connections and build those groups up."

Another community group on the rise is Hilton Harvest, a community garden with private and public plots that has been expanding its remit.

Volunteers grow and sell herb and vegetable seedlings at Hilton Harvest every Thursday and Saturday and once a month at the Freo Farmers Market.

The group hosts community music and pizza nights, and has regular bike repair and gardening workshops.

Hilton Harvest also runs an intergenerational group, Buds and Blooms, for the very young and the slightly older to get their hands dirty and grow some herbs and veggies.

Heidi Halter, the group's organiser, said the participants couldn't wait to see the results.

"They're so proud of their plants, it's wonderful," she said.

"And then we get to harvest... We have a morning tea with everything we've harvested from the garden, which is great."

Hilton Harvest chairperson and treasurer Carolyn Lilley said the garden had created a diverse and welcoming community.

"Some people come just for morning tea," she said.

"It's a spot where people of all abilities, all ages, can come and just enjoy."

Finally, but certainly not all, is Hilton Dads, which also receives support from Meerlinga.

It's a group for dads to get together, share parenting stories and have fun with their kids every second Sunday.

Daniel Reeves joined the group about four years ago after the birth of his first child.

"I saw it as an opportunity to meet other dads, to bond with my kid, and give my wife some precious hours of space on a Sunday morning, which is always nice," he said.

Daniel, original from Darwin, said Hilton's character helped him feel welcome.

"People spend a lot of time outside tending gardens and everyone's super friendly," he said.

"I've met lots of people now, especially through the dad's group, who say, 'hey, how you going?'"

"It's definitely a very community and friendly orientated kind of place. And I think the suburb design helps to foster that."






We take a look back at the Fremantle International Street Arts Festival.

TWO DECADES OF WORLD-CLASS PERFORMANCES

Partially inspired by the beauty – and acoustics – of Fremantle Town Hall, Hans Hug created the Fremantle Chamber Orchestra (FCO) and put on an inaugural performance that set the tone for the next 20 years.

Hans Hug knew he was onto a winner when the Fremantle Chamber Orchestra's first performance was underway in 2005.

"It was very obvious during the concert," he said.

"I'm not exaggerating.

"People ran into the green room, and you could see it in their faces, and they would throw their arms in the air, and it was not the way that mature-age classical music lovers usually behave.

"The enthusiasm from the crowd and the feedback was so overwhelming."

The first concert was conducted by Ollivier-Philippe Cuneo who went on to work with Opera Australia, the Australian Ballet and is now based in Paris teaching and conducting.

He has also continued to work with the orchestra.

Ollivier-Philippe praised the quality of the orchestra's performances which often include rarely heard compositions.

"It is a pillar of Fremantle's cultural scene while providing invaluable opportunities for young musicians to play alongside seasoned professionals," he said.

"It was a privilege to be a part of the orchestra since its founding and to compose two works for FCO.

"I have an enormous respect for Hans Hug's dedication, energy and vision."

Hans, originally from Switzerland, married a local girl who lured him to Fremantle more than 36 years ago and the history and culture helped convince him to stay.

The celloist was particularly struck by Fremantle's Town Hall and out of the orchestra's roughly 240 performances the majority have been at the historic building.

The orchestra has given young musicians valuable performance time and created opportunities for musicians around Fremantle and Perth to work in an ensemble.

Many have also performed with the Western Australian Symphony Orchestra and overseas.

Hans has also brought international musicians to perform with the orchestra such as world-renowned violinist Rudolf Koelman.

The Dutchman has performed with the orchestra virtually every year since its inception.

Hans said Rudolf elevated the orchestra when he performed with them.

"You are emotionally invested because there are pieces that are really happy pieces, there are the pieces that are really just old and powerful," he said.

"And then there are pieces that are just so touching and so straight to the heart.

"Musicians like Rudolf can every time he puts his bow on the strings just blow you away because it goes straight to the heart."

Hans said the orchestra had recorded live performances with Rudolf which had been featured on ABC Classic and on more than 65 European radio stations.

The orchestra has also received more than five million listens on YouTube and Spotify.

To celebrate 20 years, the orchestra will be performing on 9, 10 and 22 August and 1 and 2 November.

The orchestra's special 20th anniversary concert will be part of the Fremantle Festival: 10 Nights in Port, and includes an exciting light experience.

HANGING OUT IN THE BUFF

It's been a Fremantle working-class institution for decades, and patroned by multiple generations, but just a few years ago its future wasn't looking so bright. Then came the "young" people.

If you're going to step inside the Buffalo Club on High Street in the West End, then you need to show respect.

To the club's history, its regulars, the older patrons and especially the toilets.

Buffalo Club regular Bruce, who's been coming since 1987, isn't too happy about recent graffiti in the toilets.

"We're not a night club," he grumbled while sitting with his friend Tina at the bar during Stubbie Club on a Saturday.

"We're a social club that's for the community."

Unfortunately, the community hadn't been turning up like they used to.

Membership and patron numbers were so low that the club, established in 1938, was looking unsustainable.

Then came the "young" people (those in their mid 30s and 40s) about four years ago.

Buffalo Club vice-convenor Anna Farrant was one of those who joined the club and became determined to get the "old girl" back on her feet.

She's also not too impressed with the graffiti that they all had to clean up.

Anna said the membership has now grown from about 90 in 2021 to nearly 1000 today.

"That's the level of community interest and engagement and commitment to this wonderfully eccentric space," she said.

The Buffalo Club, a working-class haven and fixture of the Fremantle community for so many decades, is still herself to the core but now has new offerings.

There's live music from Freo bands and international acts, yoga upstairs in the time-capsule 1970s function room, stand-up comedy nights, life drawing classes, art exhibitions, electronic music nights, free meals for those in need, and more.

It's a place for the young and old, the non-binary, the occasional Japanese punk band, the darts players, the snooker lovers, the artists, the ex-wharfies, fishers, people experiencing homelessness and those who love to prop up a bar and share, or not share, their wisdom.

There's also a unisex bathroom.

That respect you show when you walk through the doors extends pretty far these days.

Anna said the regulars, many of whom had been there since the 60s and 70s, had welcomed the new arrivals.

"We've had some really great and spirited conversations over the years about how things are changing in the club," she said.

"But I think there was an understanding that it was a necessary evolution.

"We didn't want to turn it into a nameless city bar. We wanted to keep it how it was, but we needed to make some changes to save it."

Former bookie and Buffalo Club member Michael "Mickey" Sheehy said the club had a rich history but without the industries that Fremantle once had it didn't have the same regular turnover of new members.

He said he first pulled up a stool at the bar in 1970 when he was 18 while working in the wool sheds on Marine Terrace.

"It was five deep (at the bar) and every nationality came here and not one person cared where you were from or your history," he said.

"You could be on the run from Melbourne, you could have a warrant on yourself from Queensland and no one cared.

"You turned up here, you behaved, and you did behave because you wanted to come back."

At the other end of the bar, Tina Bond recalled learning that lesson in 1985 on her first day at the club when her cheeky remark, "Doesn't anybody smile around here?", nearly got her barred for life.

"I loved the old people and listening to their stories, and every time you see them, they get bigger and bigger," she said with a laugh.

"But you love their passion."

The "Buff" as it stands is a drawcard for the young.

Cousins Clem and Marshall Hutchinson said it reminded them of similar clubs in their native New Zealand and Canada respectively.

"I love the old style of the place," Clem said.

"I love having a chat with the older guys."

It's also the staff that has kept the Buffalo Club going through the good and tough times.

Duty manager Vicki Roberts has been doing it for 40 years. She said the patrons and members felt like family and she was grateful for the new generation for helping the club.

"Volunteer-wise they put in all their time," she said.

"They are cleaning things, doing things, running around, a lot of behind-the-scenes stuff that they do, bands, bookings and things like that.

"Now I'm confident because the younger people have stepped up."

Anna said that with the increased number of volunteers and the experience of the regulars they had been able to upgrade the electrics, fix damaged ceilings, restore wooden flooring, paint, work on the rich history of the building and its members, and bring in much-needed revenue from gigs, events and activities.

"I think the club is Fremantle to its bones," she said.

"As the world has changed around it, it's remained what it is, which I think is an inherently Fremantle structure, where all kinds of different people have, and will, walk through the doors to continue that legacy."






